Amo 7:7 Thus he shewed me: and, behold, the Lord stood upon a wall [made] by a plumbline, with a plumbline in his hand.

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Rom 10:17 So then faith [cometh] by hearing, and hearing by the word of God.

I often see in my mind's eye the journey of the Israelites return home from Babylon, a long and arduous journey. Why would they leave knowing what lay before them in the journey? It seems that this journey was at a time when their lives were made easier by those who had taken them captive, so why leave to return to a place of disarray, a place where all was destroyed and their lives were torn asunder?

Ezra was the son of Seraiah, the son of Azariah, the son of Hilkiah, a high priest, ready to go forth in obedience to the Lord God. He had a mighty work that lay before him – knowing the enemy, Satan, is always endeavoring to tear down the people of God in Christ Jesus.

Ezra's heart was turned to the Lord powerfully and was willing and ready to take the responsibility of leading a people back "home," a people who had walked in disobedience to the Lord, bringing in those of other places who worshiped not the God of Israel, those who brought with them many gods – against the Lord's commandments. This was not an easy task that lay before him, leading the people back "home."

But, Ezra was not looking for an easy work. He was not looking to hold a position of authority. He desired that he and the others could return "home" and there worship the only true, living God. He desired to go to Beth-El, the house of God, a place where the people would be one with their God to worship the Lord God together as a body under the authority of the Lord God Almighty.

We are talking about the "Church in the Wilderness" that went astray and has at this time repented, served their seventy years in bondage for disobedience, a people who returned to the only living God, ready to serve Him and Him alone.

I believe Ezra was hungry, longing once more for the people to come together in the Lord and to serve Him faithfully. How glorious to return to Beth-El, if you will. When will our hearts be hungry for worship, true worship of the only living God in Christ Jesus?

Psa 119:11 Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee.
